Special Campus Tours (Friday and Saturday)

Virtual/Augmented Reality Lab - Friday at 9:00 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. BIC 3555

Join this tour of COD's 21st century ARVR classroom to learn how virtual reality can transform teaching and learning to better assist students in up-leveling their public speaking and communication skills. Meet at the East entrance of the HEC to board a bus to go to the Virtual Reality Lab.

Homeland Security Education Center & Homeland Training Center - Friday at 1:00 p.m.

Training first responders to be effective communicators in highly charged situations is key to safety and security. This tour will journey you through COD's state-of-the art facilities used to train first responders. Innovating the Communication Classroom – Best (Step-Ball) Change I Made to My Syllabus (Repeats on Saturday, 3:30 p.m.)

A course syllabus outlines all of the essential information for a student (and their parents/guardians) and explains how students will be assessed on specified content at specified times or intervals throughout the course. However, the pandemic heightened the importance of a course syllabus as it helped ensure clarity, expectations, and even provided options for personalized education. Clybourne Park is set both before and after the events in Lorraine Hansberry's classic play A Raisin in the Sun. Winner of the 2012 Tony Award for Best Play, Clybourne Park focuses on residents of the same house in the now predominantly black neighborhood as they fight against the advances of gentrification.

2022 SANDFORD Award Jeff Przybylo



Jeff Przybylo is a proud graduate of Northern Illinois University (BA) & Illinois State University (MA). He is in his 27th year as a professor of Communication Arts & Director of Forensics at Harper Community College (Palatine, Illinois). He has served as chairperson of the Communication Arts department as well as interim Dean of Liberal Arts.

Among his many accomplishments, Jeff has served as President of the Illinois Communication Association and President of the national community college speech and debate association, Phi Rho Pi (9 years).

In his years with ICTA (ISTA), Jeff has served as higher ed chair, higher ed forensics chair, newsletter editor, president, and a member of countless convention planning committees. Jeff has attended convention 27 years in a row. In those years, he has presented on over 50 convention panels.

Jeff has been at the forefront of the movement to bring technology into the communication classroom. He has been recording student speeches for analysis since his first day in the classroom and enthusiastically embraced the online learning movement. Throughout his career he's seen the basic speech course as an opportunity to not only teach basic public speaking skills but to engage students in technology, leadership, teamwork, and peer-coaching. His goal as a professor of communication has always been to be innovative in the classroom. He aims to shed the image of professor as "sage on the stage" and instead act as a "coach" who develops strategies to encourage students to get actively involved in their education.

EDITH MARJORIE HARROD AWARD

Edith served as President of the Illinois Speech and Theatre Association in 1966, and was a member of the Illinois Board of Education for five years. She received her B.A. degree from Eureka College in 1943, and her M.A. degree from the University of Iowa in 1949. She completed additional graduate study at Northwestern University in Evanston and the University of Minnesota. She taught Drama and English at Eureka High School from 1943 to 1951 before teaching Drama at Pekin Community High School from 1951 to 1971. She was an Associate Professor of Creative Arts at Illinois Central College where she taught Speech and Drama until her death in 1976. At Illinois Central College she created an interdisciplinary course in the humanities including art, drama, music and philosophy. In 1961, she was awarded the John Hay Fellowship in Humanities. She attended symposia on theater at Stratford, Ontario, Canada, in 1965, 1966 and 1968, studying with Tyrone Guthrie, who helped establish the Shakespeare Festival there, and who founded the Guthrie Theater in Minneapolis. She was director of Broadway Theater League and Cornstock Theater. She directed plays for Cornstock Theater and at Illinois Central College directed Readers' Theater and Plays for Living. Anthony Domenic Zoubek has worked as a high school English Language Arts since 2006. In that time, he has received the Kane County Distinguished Educator of the Year Award (2010) and the ICTA Jerry Mathis Young Teacher Award (2011). In 2016, Anthony's professional experiences were profiled at length by the *Chicago Daily Herald* newspaper, which named him one of "The Suburbs' Top Five Teachers."

For the majority of his career, in addition to teaching, Anthony has coached IHSA Speech Individual Events for Bartlett High School in Elgin Unit-46, the second-largest school district in the state. Several years ago, he cowrote the district's current Senior English and Middle School Speech-Debate curricula, and led the team that overhauled the district's high school Forensic Speech and Debate curriculum.

Anthony earned two undergraduate Bachelor of Science degrees from Illinois State University. His first, in Mass Communication, placed special emphases on Journalism, Visual Communication, and Film Study. His second, in Communication (Speech) Education, gave him the focus and drive necessary to meet the needs of his students. In 2011, he received his thesis-track Master of Science degree in English Studies at Elmhurst University and, concurrently, completed his National Board Teaching Certification. He has represented ICTA with panel presentations at two Central States Communication Association Conventions.

Out of the classroom, Anthony enjoys reading and writing research-based journalism and creative nonfiction. As an undergraduate, he published a book of film criticism and narrative essays, participated in a book-signing tour throughout the Midwest, became a featured guest on several radio programs, and was profiled in the *Wall Street Journal*. (On the subject of cinema, when asked to name his all-time favorite movie, Anthony will cite *Cinema Paradiso* or *Vertigo* or *The Best Years of Our Lives*, depending on his mood at the time when such a question is posed). When he isn't trying to creatively write with a literary voice modeled after John Irving, Mike Royko, Stephen King, Jean Shephard, and his Grandpa Anton (a reporter, suburban politician, and namesake), Anthony bides his time with baseball box scores. He

watches and attends Chicago White Sox and Colorado Rockies games. A Colorado native raised in Chicago's near-west suburbs, Anthony quips, "My baseball *heart* is on the Southside, but my *soul* is in the mountains." He volunteers as the editor and paginator of the National Ballpark Museum's newsletter.

In his spare time, Anthony adds new colors to his growing hoard of Converse All-Stars, maintains a collection of several-thousand vinyl records, continues in his slow restoration of a 1972 MGB-GT roadster, makes high-quality lamps out of commemorative Coca-Cola and wine bottles, and exhibits an on-again, off-again obsession with pinball.

2022 Connie Link Award Winner Janine Stroemer



My journey through the Speech and Theatre world has been a long and rewarding one! I graduated from Victor Andrew HS in 1983 having spent four years on the Speech Team and the majority of after school time in the theatre. In the spring of 1983, I entered NIU on a scholarship to pursue a degree in Theatre Education with a minor in Speech Ed. Feeling such

gratitude for my coach and director, I would return to my high school during winter and spring breaks to volunteer in both programs. After earning my BA in Theatre Ed, I came home to try my hand as an actor in Chicago. Due to family circumstances, this endeavor was short-lived, so I returned to school to add a MA in Communication to my resume. During that time, I had the opportunity to both teach and coach as a grad assistant in the Illinois State COMM department.

After graduation I secured a full-time sub teaching job at Rich Township where I volunteered my time to help the Speech students. After the year as a sub, I was hired as an English teacher and assistant speech coach Rich Central H.S. and the following year I was asked to teach full time and work as a head coach. During my 10 years of teaching at Rich Central I worked to build the speech program sending students to the IHSA State tournament each year. Throughout my tenure at District 227, I have been an active member of the Illinois Communication and Theatre Association (ICTA) presenting each year at the annual convention as a member of numerous panels, and a presenter at new coaches' workshops. This year I held the office of President; I organized and ran convention in September 2021.

In 2004, I began teaching at Homewood-Flossmoor HS seizing the opportunity to get involved in theater program, specifically to direct Group Interpretation. In the classroom, I solely taught the sophomore class which was comprised of one semester of Speech and one of Literature and Writing. Appointed the English 2 team leader, one of my primary roles was to revise curriculum to include more speech activities and add creative interpretation assignments. My school wide charge was to integrate more speaking and listening skills into the total curriculum working with the Science and Social Studies departments to create common standards and rubrics. During my time at H-F, I was humbled and honored to be nominated twice for the Golden Apple Teaching Award.

As the head coach, I have had the pleasure and honor to work with so many students and develop strong relationships with area coaches and their students. As head coach of HF Speech, I have enjoyed the opportunity to coach nearly 300 students to the IHSA State Finals tournament, culminating is 30 IHSA state finalists, including six state champions! Perhaps my most challenging and rewarding moment was coaching our team to 5th place during COVID pandemic/online State competition. Other highlights include creating Competitive Forensics class as an academic co-curricular for Speech Team, creating the SWSC Novice Speech Training workshop and holding the SWSC Conference Championship 13 years straight before it was disbanded. Most recently I earned Three-Diamond coach status in the National Speech and Debate Association.

In my tenure with competitive drama, H-F has delivered seventeen of our eighteen group interpretation entries to the IHSA State Tournament; 13 of them making it to the final round (top 6) with nine shows placing in the top three; a State Championship in 2007 with "Lysistrata" and again in 2017 with "A Head Full of Dreams: The John Merrick story, original writing based on the life of "the Elephant Man." One of the highlights throughout my GI experience was ALUMNI WEEK; all former GI students are invited to "drop in" to any rehearsal for the purpose keeping alum active in the program and allowing them the opportunity to share their knowledge and "pay it forward".

As I review my amazing opportunities, I truly appreciate all the professional relationships and personal friendships I have made through these competitive activities, and after retiring I am looking forward to being accessible to young coaches to further promote these activities and help students succeed.

JERRY MATHIS NEW TEACHER AWARD

Jerry served as President of the Illinois Speech and Theatre Association in 1985 and was a Professor of Speech and Theater at Sauk Valley College. He coached individual events for a while, but was much more active in oral interpretation festival competitions. Mathis published and presented several papers at on oral interpretation at national conferences. He directed numerous outstanding theater productions during his tenure at Sauk Valley College. An endowed scholarship in his name has been established at Sauk Valley College. Shortly after his death, the College also built a new state of the art theater and named it the Jerry Mathis Theater. He won several outstanding teaching awards at Sauk Valley College and was recognized nationally as an outstanding educator. The Mathis Award is presented to a current Illinois teacher who has taught five or fewer years in the field of communication or theatre and who has demonstrated outstanding potential for success in the discipline.

2022 Jerry Mathis New Teacher Award Winner Bill Lucio



William Lucio is in his fourth year at Harper College and, after just receiving tenure, he is just as committed to teaching and service as he was the day he was hired. Being the head coach of his Speech and Debate team, Bill is always busy planning meetings and practice sessions for the team, while always trying to incorporate elements of fun for his competitors. Bill is a firm believer that, if a team bonds together, they win together, which is why he takes them on outings to zoos, making them perform their speeches in front of the penguins, or pumpkin patches, using a freshly selected pumpkin as their notecard for an impromptu speech.

Keeping things fun isn't only reserved for the speech team, however. Bill likes to emphasize the power of play in the classroom, in order to help students retain comprehension, encourage study standards, and promote creative speech writing. This year, Bill turned his Speech 101 classes into the game Survivor, where his students learn important concepts related to the course and then compete in challenges that test the knowledge they've gained. The tribes that study hard earn immunity, while the losing tribes head to Tribal Council to vote players out of the game, making them ineligible for the hefty extra credit prize at the end of the semester.

In addition to his coaching duties, Bill is also committed to social justice, and is working on ways to bring more LGBTQ visibility on campus for his queer students. It's important to Bill that his LGBTQ students feel represented and supported by faculty, and he waves his pride flag high, actively engaged in Harper's Staff, Administrators, and Faculty for Equality (SAFE) to ensure that both queer students and queer employees at Harper feel welcomed, valued, respected, and celebrated.

Bill found a passion for teaching in grad school and has never stopped since. The ability to shape and mold the minds of the future generation is the greatest gift he has ever given, and he considers himself to be one of the lucky ones who loves their job so much that he never feels like he's working...he's just doing what he was put on this earth to do.

L. E. NORTON HIGHER EDUCATION STUDENT AWARD

Norton served as President of the Illinois Speech and Theatre Association in 1950. He spent his career at Bradley University where he was a Professor of Speech and served as the Director of Forensics. His status among speech educators is legendary. Norton was responsible for inventing many of the events we compete in today, including duo interpretation and informative speaking. While at Bradley, he founded Pi Kappa Delta, the honorary speech fraternity. The annual Bradley University Individual Events Invitational is named in his honor and is considered one of the most prestigious college individual events tournaments in the nation. He also coached the national championship GE College Bowl Team in 1969. This award is presented to an outstanding college major in speech or theatre who has made significant contributions to the college, community and discipline.

His impact on students has been long-standing, and the success of his students in speech and debate led to many state championships. He has written and published texts on listening and verbal communication. Upon his retirement from Belleville West High School, he started a new career as a college professor and speech and debate coach at McKendree College. The Hunsaker award is given to a high school student who has been active in speech and/or theatre activities and who has made significant contributions to the community and school.

2022 Richard A. Hunsaker High School Student Award Winner Joyce Yang



Joyce Yang is currently a freshman at the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign. She attended Bartlett High School in Bartlett, Illinois.

Specific to Speech Team, in her freshman year, Joyce tried her hand at Informative Speaking and Dramatic Duet Acting. With her Duet acting partner, tackling one of the most physically and emotionally challenging scripts in "the Bartlett archives," Joyce took 2nd Place in the Upstate Eight Conference Championship. (The UEC is the Illinois' oldest and second-largest Conference.) Going into her sophomore year, Joyce attended the College of DuPage Summer Speech Camp. (Based on her burgeoning reputation, she received a full scholarship from our school's Fine Arts Boosters.) There, among other respected Speech coaches and ICTA members, Joyce worked under the tutelage of Lauren Morgan, professor of Speech Communication.

Joyce switched her attention to Impromptu and other speaking categories with great success. As a junior, she qualified for the IHSA State Championship in two categories: Oratorical Declamation (gracefully performing a powerful speech by NY-14 Representative AOC) and Impromptu Speaking. Dating back to 1997, when BHS first opened, only three of our Speech competitors had ever qualified for State in two categories in a single season. Joyce did it again, in her senior year, becoming the Sectional Champion in Original Oratory and qualifying for State in both OO and Impromptu. To put this achievement in perspective: Bartlett is a part of Unit 46, the state's oldest and second-largest school district. The last time a U-46 student reached Joyce's forensics heights was in the late 1940s.

Joyce's competitive public speaking achievements are not limited to the IHSA. As a high school senior and Mock Trial co-captain, Joyce was named "Outstanding Attorney" at the ISBA State Final while leading her team to Bartlett's first Top Eight finish in nearly a decade. Joyce maintained a 5.0 GPA in the Dual Credit Program at Elgin Community College, earned Illinois Seals of Biliteracy in both Spanish and Mandarin, was a member of four different Honors Societies—National, Science, Spanish, and International Phi Theta Kappa—and participated in more than 10 extracurricular activities: Speech, Mock Trial, the Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders Student Union (which she founded), and Operation

Smile. She completed over 200 hours of volunteering with Feed My Starving Children, the Northern Illinois Food Bank, Peer Tutoring, the Bartlett Public Library District, and more, all while serving as a Speech Team Mentor, and a member of Mentors of Tomorrow, an organization providing free tutoring to elementary school students. This past summer, she interned at a non-profit organization serving Chicagoland's refugees and immigrants, providing them low-cost legal services and working with the community's more vulnerable populations.

The Richard A. Hunsaker High School Award is given to a student who has been active in speech and drama activities, and who has made significant contributions to their community and school. In her nomination letter, her Bartlett High School Speech coach Anthony Zoubek wrote, "In my 18 years as an ICTA member and 16 years as a secondary educator, I have never met a student who so fully, acutely, and accurately meets that description quite like Joyce. She is an emissary of Bartlett High School and our Speech Team... The rigorous demands she makes of herself—especially as an intellectually curious, constant learner, willing to challenge herself at all costs—meets, if not exceeds, the standards expected of a Hunsaker award-winner. What she does after high school will make her new peers as proud to work with her as we at BHS were saddened to see her go."
