DIVERSITY AND EQUITY SPOTLIGHT PANEL – Heart To Heart: The Pedagogy of Risk

This three-part seminar will feature Dr. Asif Wilson's "The Six Pillars of Teaching and Learning: Towards Pedagogies of Risk in P-20 Classrooms." Dr. Wilson's research builds upon Paulo Freire's life's work, which includes The Pedagogy of the Oppressed, and introduces a transformative approach to create more liberating classroom environments. Drawing upon ethnographic methods such as interviews and personal reflection, Dr. Wilson identified six key characteristics of teaching and learning, collectively forming the Pedagogy of Risk. This pedagogical framework aims to better support teachers in creating teaching and learning contexts for their students to critically read and rewrite their worlds. In part one of the seminar, Sunny Serres will host a table-talk discussion and brainstorming session focused on addressing the needs of students. Part two will feature Dr. Wilson's research presentation, providing a comprehensive view of his findings. Finally, part three will offer the opportunity for educators to explore and implement the Pedagogy of Risk in their own classrooms. This last segment will consist of a Q&A and discussion session allowing participants to delve into practical application strategies and share their own experiences.

This panel is of special interest to anyone who wants to create more equity in their classrooms while also allowing students to have more freedom and agency over their learning.

2023 SANDFORD Award Winner Lisa Stout



Lisa earned her BA in English Education, with a double minor in Speech and Drama, at Western Illinois University in 1995. In 2008, she earned an MA in English from Bradley University. After student teaching at Canton High School, she began her teaching career teaching speech and English at Limestone Community High School in the fall of 1996. There, she also coached the speech team, first as an assistant, later as head coach. After three years, in the fall of 1999, she began teaching Speech and Drama at Pekin Community High School. It was at PCHS that she really began to grow as a speech coach, under the tutelage of Eric Ewan, serving as one of his assistants. At PCHS, she also directed the fall and spring plays and served as theatre manager. One thing Lisa is incredibly proud of is bringing musicals back to PCHS, which happened later in her tenure at the school.

In the fall of 2008, Lisa moved to Washington Community High School, and she has been there ever since. At WCHS, Lisa has taught several English, speech, and drama classes, as well as dual credit composition and dual credit theatre. Lisa also built up the WCHS speech team from a tiny team with just a handful of students to a larger, more competitive team that regularly has IHSA state qualifiers, state finalists, and a State Champion in 2019. At WCHS, Lisa took over the theatre program in 2012 and currently directs the fall musical and spring play. She is also the Drama Club sponsor.

Throughout the years, Lisa has mentored many student teachers as well as assistant speech coaches and student directors. She has also served on countless boards and committees, including the IHSA Speech State Committee as well as the Speech Advisory Committee. In her rare free time, she has served as an adjunct faculty member at Bradley University, teaching English 101 and Communication 103. She has been a member of ICTA for the majority of her career. She has served on the ICTA Board of Directors twice, first as treasurer, and more recently, she was part of the ICTA Executive Board presidential rotation, serving as convention planner in 2018. She is currently an ICTA Past President.

Lisa lives in Goodfield with her husband, Jim, whom she met backstage at Peoria Players Theatre in the late 1990s. She enjoys cooking, reading, traveling, and trivia. She recently appeared on-stage in *Titanic the Musical*, directed by her dear friend Eric Ewan, at Corn Stock Theatre in Peoria, her first on-stage appearance since 2012. She loves her chosen career, and considers it a joy and a privilege to be a teacher, a coach, a director, a colleague, a mentor, a friend, and finally, Mama Stout to her kids.

EDITH MARJORIE HARROD AWARD

Edith served as President of the Illinois Speech and Theatre Association in 1966, and was a member of the Illinois Board of Education for five years. She received her B.A. degree from Eureka College in 1943, and her M.A. degree from the University of Iowa in 1949. She completed additional graduate study at Northwestern University in Evanston and the University of Minnesota. She taught Drama and English at Eureka High School from 1943 to 1951 before teaching Drama at Pekin Community High School from 1951 to 1971. She was an Associate Professor of Creative Arts at Illinois Central College where she taught Speech and Drama until her death in 1976. At Illinois Central College she created an interdisciplinary course in the humanities including art, drama, music and philosophy. In 1961, she was awarded the John Hay Fellowship in Humanities. She attended symposia on theater at Stratford, Ontario, Canada, in 1965, 1966 and 1968, studying with Tyrone Guthrie, who helped establish the Shakespeare Festival there, and who founded the Guthrie Theater in Minneapolis. She was director of Broadway Theater League and Cornstock Theater. She directed plays for Cornstock Theater and at Illinois Central College directed Readers' Theater and Plays for Living. The Harrod award is In recognition of distinguished service to the Association and outstanding achievement in the profession.

Jerry served as President of the Illinois Speech and Theatre Association in 1985 and was a Professor of Speech and Theater at Sauk Valley College. He coached individual events for a while, but was much more active in oral interpretation festival competitions. Mathis published and presented several papers on oral interpretation at national conferences. He directed numerous outstanding theater productions during his tenure at Sauk Valley College. An endowed scholarship in his name has been established at Sauk Valley College. Shortly after his death, the College also built a new state of the art theater and named it the Jerry Mathis Theater. He won several outstanding teaching awards at Sauk Valley College and was recognized nationally as an outstanding educator. The Mathis Award is presented to a current Illinois teacher who has taught five or fewer years in the field of communication or theatre and who has demonstrated outstanding potential for success in the discipline.

The annual Bradley University Individual Events Invitational is named in his honor and is considered one of the most prestigious college individual events tournaments in the nation. He also coached the national championship GE College Bowl Team in 1969. This award is presented to an outstanding college major in speech or theatre who has made significant contributions to the college, community and discipline.
