Keynote Speaker

Dr. Larry Dietz, Illinois State University President



Larry Dietz became the 19th president of Illinois State University March 22, 2014. He came to the University in June 2011 as vice president for Student Affairs. He led the Division of Student Affairs, which includes the Dean of Students Office, Student Health Services, Student Counseling Center, University Housing Services, Disability Concerns, Career Center, Campus Dining Services, Campus Recreation, Bone Student Center and Braden Auditorium, Student Affairs Information Technology, Health Promotion and Wellness, and the University Police, as well as other units. He is also a tenured associate professor in the Department of Educational Administration and Foundations.

Previously, he served as vice chancellor for Student Affairs at Southern Illinois University Carbondale (SIUC) for 10 years. Dietz also served as special assistant to the chancellor at SIUC and as a tenured associate professor in educational administration and higher education. Prior to his tenure there, he served as vice chancellor for Student Affairs and Enrollment Management, among other leadership positions, at the University of Missouri-Kansas City for 15 years, and in leadership positions at Iowa State University for 13 years.

Dietz earned a Ph.D. in higher education administration and his master's degree in higher education and student personnel from Iowa State University and his bachelor's degree in political science from Southern Illinois University. He attended the Institute for Educational Management at Harvard University, a Fulbright International Education Seminar for Administrators in Germany and the Harvard Management Development Program.

Dietz was selected to represent the American Universities Iraq Consortium on a panel with Prime Minister Al-Malaki and represented SIUC at the Iraq Education Initiative in Baghdad. He had responsibility for SIUC's campus in Japan and has negotiated agreements with institutions in China, Malaysia, Kuwait, Germany and the Czech Republic







2015Sandford Award Winner JUDY SANTACATERINA





She has taught courses at the junior high, high school, community college and university level. For the past 33 years she has served as the Director of Individual Events at Northern Illinois University. She has been a member of ICTA since 1979; she was the 2012 Convention keynote speaker and served on the executive board as secretary in 1984 and President in 2013. EDITH MARJORIE HARROD AWARD

Edith served as President of the Illinois Speech Association in 1966, and was a member of the Illinois Board of Education for five years. She taught Drama and English at Eureka High School from 1943 to 1951. She taught Drama at Pekin Community High School from 1951 to 1971. She was an Associate Professor of Creative Arts at Illinois Central College where she taught Speech and Drama until her death in 1976. At Illinois Central College she created an interdisciplinary course in the humanities including art, drama, music and philosophy. She received her B.A. degree from Eureka College in 1943, and her M.A. degree from the University of Iowa in 1949. She completed additional graduate study at Northwestern University in Evanston and the University of Minnesota. In 1961, she was awarded the John Hay Fellowship in Humanities. She attended symposia on theater at Stratford, Ontario, Canada, in 1965, 1966 and 1968, studying with Tyrone Guthrie, who helped establish the Shakespeare Festival there, and who founded the Guthrie Theater in Minneapolis. She was director of Broadway Theater League and Cornstock Theater. She directed plays for Cornstock Theater and at Illinois Central College directed Readers' Theater and Plays for Living. The Harrod award is In recognition of distinguished service to the Association and outstanding achievement in the profession.

2015 Harrod Award Winner DOUG JENNINGS



After serving for approximately 20 years on the ICTA – ISTA board, Jennings is stepping away from those duties at this convention. His 43 years of teaching included stints at North Liberty and Ben Davis High Schools in Indiana, Berry College in Rome, GA, and over 30 years at Illinois State University. He taught classes in speech and drama prior to serving as Associate Director in the School of Communication at Illinois State. His favorite time, however, was his tenure working with the communication teacher education students at ISU. He received teaching and career service awards from Berry College, the School of Com, the College of Arts and Sciences, and Illinois State University.

JERRY MATHIS NEW TEACHER AWARD

Jerry served as President in 1985 and was a Professor of Speech and Theater at Sauk Valley College. He coached individual events for a while, but was much more active in oral interpretation festival competitions. Mathis published and presented several papers at national conferences on oral interpretation. He directed numerous outstanding theater productions during his tenure at Sauk Valley College. An Endowed scholarship in his name has been established at Sauk Valley College. Shortly after his death, the College also built a new state of the art theater and named it the Jerry Mathis Theater. He won several outstanding teaching awards at Sauk Valley College and was recognized nationally as an outstanding educator. The Mathis Award is presented to a current Illinois teacher who has taught five or fewer years in the field of communication or theatre and who has demonstrated outstanding potential for success in the discipline.



He also coached the national championship GE College Bowl Team in 1969. This award is presented to an outstanding college major in speech or theatre who has made significant contributions to the college, community and discipline.

2015 Norton Award Winner-Graduate YANELLY VALLEGAS



Yanelly Villegas recently completed her masters in Communication from Northern Illinois University, with a certification in LGBT studies. Moreover, she earned her undergraduate degree in political science and communication studies from Northern, as well. Besides excelling academically, Yanelly successfully competed on Northern's Individual Events Team. In competition, Yanelly garnered state and national success, in particular as a semi- finalist debate and impromptu speaker at Pi Kappa Delta. Yanelly has also worked as a teacher/coach at Northern's High School Summer Forensic Institute.

During the past two years, Yanelly transitioned from a successful competitor to an excellent coach for the Northern Team. She is one of the few students who had expertise in both debate and individual events. She used this expertise to coach students in multiple events. As an undergraduate and graduate student, Yanelly Villegas was crucial to maintaining the NIU forensics program by recruiting and retaining new members. As an undergraduate she worked with Northern's Director of Forensics, Lisa Roth and Professor Tim West to develop a debate curriculum for Master's students in Accountancy. Her work was recognized at the National Association of Accountancy Educators, where she received a top award as well as by the College of Business for the contributions to the Graduate Program in Accountancy. Her work with ACE, Argument Centered Education has provided debate experiences to Chicago's underserved high school students

At both the undergraduate and graduate level, Yanelly has been honored for her fine research. Her areas of scholarship include Women and Gender Studies as well as a strong commitment to bringing advocacy and debate to other disciplines. Presently she, along with Lisa Roth and Tim West are finishing a text book for both undergraduate and graduate students, on Argumentation, Advocacy and Accountancy.

CONNIE LINK OUTSTANDING MENTORSHIP AWARD

The Connie Link Outstanding Mentorship Award is named in memory of long-standing member and past president Connie Link The award is given to a teacher currently teaching (or retired) in Illinois who has taught speech, theatre, and/or English for a significant length of time (10 years or more). The qualifications for this award include distinguished service to the association and outstanding achievement in the profession, especially in mentorship of teachers and/or speech/theatre coaches and directors. This award recognizes outstanding mentorship toward new and current ICTA members, assistance in recruitment of new members to the organization and outreach to past ICTA members who are no longer active in the organization. The award recipient must have been an active member of ICTA for at least 5 years.

2015 Link Mentorship Award Winner MARION KLEINAU




Marion Kleinau was a devoted teacher and mentor, and coaching was her favorite tool for mentoring. Last month some of her former students, most on the verge of retirement themselves, gathered to once again say, "thank you" to Dr. Kleinau. This is not the first time. The cause for this dedication to someone that worked with them forty years ago is pretty simple. Marion simply loved her students. Together with her students they created a theatre, called "The Calipre," for the single purpose of working with the kind of performance not being done on the more traditional stage.

For Marion the production of non-dramatic literature was an important way to get inside poetry, diaries, good literature and what have you. But finding the material was just the beginning; it was the building of the script and the production techniques that made all the difference. The Calipre served as the proving grounds for much of that learning. It was the first such designated performance area, in the academic arena, and intended as a laboratory for creating (and failing, if necessary). Among other firsts, Giant City State Park in Southern Illinois, was the site of the first national gathering of people in the field of what is now called Performance Studies, who were working in the area of what they then called "performance in social contexts"," a trend which has since grown creatively. In addition, SIU was the home of the first workshop in group performance, which was carried on for several subsequent years until it was picked up by other venues.

Marion was responsible for over 30 master's thesis projects and over 45 doctoral dissertations, let alone hundreds of undergraduates. Her dedication to students has been rewarded by the national interpretation group and her text THEATRES FOR LITERATURE, is one of the few books in the field devoted entirely to group performance.

Although much of her professional work has been carried out through the national organization, she has always felt that ISTA (ICA) was one of the basic avenues through which she could share with secondary students across the state. It was, in fact, her professional home, and its members some of her closest friends.

2015 Link Mentorship Award Winner MARVIN KLEINAU



I don't think Marvin Kleinau ever talked to a student, either in his high school teaching years or as a university professor, without personally measuring them up as potential debaters or some kind of speech performer. His first teaching job was to teach five different classes daily, (two of them speech), direct four plays a year and coach all individual events, as well as assisting in coaching football, basketball, baseball, and track. Students never got far out of Kleinau's sight. In fact some of his best readers were football players. He still communicates with the linebacker that did "Of Mice and Men."

This constant attention to potential speech students was the result of the way he was treated while in high school. Speech was very big and speech students where at the top of the students most likely to succeed list. And they proved themselves when they outpointed big time speech schools like Rock Island and East Moline; and finally, when Kleinau went back home to coach, Peoria schools and Galesburg. He always said, "The talent is there, you just have to encourage it to come out of the woodwork."

Kleinau had his biggest challenge when he was directed to coach students in the University high school at SIU as he began work on his doctorate. He had a state champion his first year, but it was his second year that his ability to mentor students that had never been to a speech contest before took hold. Marvin challenged the talented students to give it a try and after a lot of hard work, the school advanced a student in every event to the state finals and ended up losing the top award by a single point.

Marvin was the recipient of the Amoco award, as the top SIU undergraduate teacher in 1977. He has written debate books with Dick Hunsaker and nine debate manuals while he directed debate workshops that turned out five future national champions. He served many years in ISTA leadership positions and loved every second.

RICHARD A. HUNSAKER HIGH SCHOOL STUDENT AWARD

Hunsaker served as President of the Illinois Speech & Theater Association in 1972. He built a distinguished 30-year career teaching speech, drama, and debate at Belleville West High School. His exemplary teaching, coaching, and communication skills brought him national recognition as an outstanding Illinois Educator. His impact on students has been long-standing, and the success of his students in speech and debate led to many State Championships. He has written and published texts on listening and verbal communication. Upon his retirement from Belleville West High School, he started a new career as a college professor and speech and debate coach at McKendree College. The Hunsaker award is given to a high school student who has been active in speech and/or theatre activities and who has made significant contributions to the community and school.
